VETERANS DAY 2011 OUR HEROES' TREE

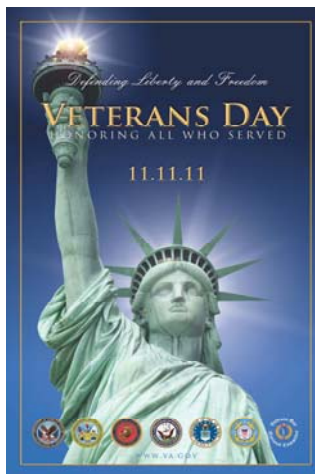
History of Veterans Day

World War I – known at the time as “The Great War” -officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919, in the Palace of Versailles outside the town of Versailles, France. However, fighting ceased seven months earlier when an armistice, or temporary cessation of hostilities, between the Allied nations and Germany went into effect on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. For that reason, November 11, 1918, is generally regarded as the end of “the war to end all wars .”

An act approved May 13, 1938, made the 11th of November in each year a legal holiday—a day to be dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be thereafter celebrated and known as “Armistice Day. ”

In 1954, after World War II had required the greatest mobilization of soldiers, sailors, Marines and airmen in the Nation's history; after American forces had fought aggression in Korea, the 83rd Congress, at the urging of the veterans service organizations, amended the Act of 1938 by striking out the word “Armistice” and inserting in its place the word “Veterans.” With the approval of this legislation (Public Law 380) on June 1, 1954, November 11th became a day to honor American veterans of all wars.

Veterans Day continues to be observed on November 11, regardless of what day of the week on which it falls. The restoration of the observance of Veterans Day to November 11 not only preserves the historical significance of the date, but helps focus attention on the important purpose of Veterans Day: A celebration to honor America's veterans for their patriotism, love of country, and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good.



In 2008, Colfax-Perry Twp. Public Library & Local History Museum began participating in the Our Heroes' Tree community program at the invitation of the Military Family Research Institute at Purdue. Every day library patrons & museum visitors appreciate the military uniform collection, which represents all branches of service and many eras of war and peacetime.



Our Heroes' Tree is a community engagement program co-founded in 2005 by Stephanie Pickup, author of *The Soldier's Tree*, and Marlene Lee, author of *The Hero in My Pocket*.

Our Heroes' Tree promotes awareness of the service and sacrifice of U.S. service members and their families. It is inclusive of all branches of service, Active Duty, Guard, and Reserve, and all generations.

As a community-based program, Our Heroes' Tree benefits citizens of all ages by: -- Promoting and enhancing awareness of the service and sacrifice of U.S. service members and their families -- Bridging the military and civilian communities and fostering community support and involvement -- Promoting patriotic literacy for individuals, families, communities, and the nation.



You are invited to craft ornaments to honor & remember your friends and family veterans or active-duty service members to display on the 2011 Our Heroes' Tree. Library staff can photocopy original photographs and assist with designs. The annual Our Heroes' Tree display is available for viewing & for adding ornaments, early November through December.

LIBRARY TECHNICAL UPGRADES / UPDATES

Following the Library Board's decision to retire & spend down the Capital Projects Fund budget (per IN Library Law), the plan to replace & upgrade servers, computers, and software was implemented last September.

Three new public access desktop computers were acquired, one new server (which replaced two 10-year old network servers), plus a safe/secure back-up system .

Operating system software licenses and Office suite licenses were purchased very economically via TechSoup, "a nonprofit entity providing other nonprofits and libraries with technology that empowers them to fulfill their missions and serve their communities."

Adding 3 new computer stations upstairs, allowed the 3 current public computers to move downstairs to the Children's Library. With a bit of creative re-purposing of current library computer furniture and the addition of two new pieces, comfortable, more user-friendly space is provided both adults and youth.

The final step, expanding DSL bandwidth to accommodate an increased volume of Internet traffic is scheduled a.s.a.p.

The library network, hardware, and software are well-equipped to provide 21st Century technical service to library staff & patrons!

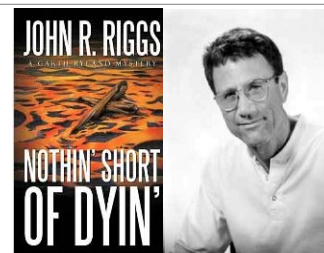

The historic photographs of Frankfort's architecture, events, homes, & businesses trigger memories for lifetime Clinton County residents and will enlighten and inform newcomers. Surprisingly, a mystery has already been solved for our museum. A photo-canvas of a gun-smith shop was thought to be of a turn-of-the-century business in Colfax. However, the same photo appears in the aforementioned book and is clearly identified as a shop in Frankfort. We are pleased to accurately identify the shop & owner in this interesting historic photograph.

Resources for genealogy research have been acquired for the museum reference collection:

Family Names files are being developed with copies of historic photographs, obituaries, letters, newspaper clippings, documents, etc. will be collected in individual files under surnames to assist family research. With permission of visitors doing research, copies of materials can be filed to assist fellow historians.

Museum & library visitors reminisce and share memories of traditions long established in the Colfax community. One such tradition involved white crosses on the library grounds, memorializing military veterans. Colfax Public Library began supporting military service men & women beginning in 1917 as WWI approached. After WWII, Colfax American Legion organized and staged a fish fry fundraiser on the library grounds. Later, the Legion provided a flag-pole and flag, as well as memorial stone markers for Civil War veterans and Veterans of all wars. Memorial Day, 2011, the Museum acquired white crosses and bronze medallion flag holders representing each branch of the U.S. military, to reinstate an honorable tradition, preserving an important part of local Colfax history.

The 2011 Civil War Sesquicentennial Anniversary Year is closing. The library book collection includes many books relating first-hand accounts of veteran's, physicians, widows of soldiers, and families waiting for the war to end and the safe return of their loved ones. An interesting display of historical posters, a personal shadow-box of GAR memorabilia, and authentic photo books documenting battles, soldiers, and officers are on display in the main library.

Obituaries published in the Clinton County Review reveal facts about many CW veterans and their role in the history of our local communities. These records are being copied for preservation in the museum's Veteran's Scrapbook. A selection of veteran's & pioneer's obituaries appear in this newsletter.

The Indiana Historical Society will mark the 150th anniversary over the next four years by publishing articles on all aspects of Indiana's role in the Civil War.

Freeman Teegarden Sept. 30, 1920

DEATH OF FREEMAN TEEGARDEN

Freeman Teegarden, age 80 years died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. David Ghere of near Darlington last Thursday following an extended illness due to the infirmities of his age. He was the son of William and Eleanor (Ducat) Teegarden and was born in Clinton County, Ind., March 21, 1840. Just as he was entering manhood, the Civil War broke out and he enlisted in the cause of the north and served throughout the bloody conflict, being in some of the memorable battles with Generals Gragg, Sherman, and Buell. He was discharged in 1864 at Indianapolis, and in 1867 was married to Lucy M. Gardner. They came to Colfax in the early 70's and Mr. Teegarden engaged in the lumber business, both as a buyer of timber and also a mill man, operating one of the largest saw mills in this section of the state. Later in life, he secured a patent on a corn shredder, and manufactured the

machine in the building now occupied by Ed Lucas. The business soon outgrew this location and a stock company was organized to operate on a larger scale, and the industry was moved to new and more commodious quarters, where for a time they did a splendid business, but adversity beset their paths and the enterprise went under for the want of sufficient financial backing to stem the tide. Following this unsuccessful venture Mr. Teegarden, who had reached the shady side of life, retired to the farm, where he passed the balance of his life in the quiet and independent atmosphere of the farmer.

Mr. Teegarden was the father of eight children, Maud of Windfall, Wallace of Richmond, Bennie of Indianapolis, Ear, deceased, Anna of Russiaville, Bessie and William of Frankfort, and Mabel of Darlington.

His wife preceded him to the Great Beyond two years ago and since that time

Mr. Teegarden made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Ghere.

Leander Vail, son of James and Selina Hampton Vail, was born in Montgomery County Indiana, Nov. 12, 1848. He spent The early part of his life on the farm, and at the age of sixteen, he enlisted in the Union army and served from the sixth day of March, 1865 until the end of the war with Co. F. 44th regiment being discharged on the 14th day of Sept. 1865.

FRED MITCHELL PASSES AWAY

Fred Mitchell, age 86 years and one of Montgomery County pioneers, died Wednesday at the home of his son William Mitchell of near Bowers Station, his death resulting from a stroke of paralysis that he suffered several weeks ago.

Mr. Mitchell was a native of Germany, being born at Whittenburg, and was a son of Ferdinand and Hannah Mitchell. He later moved to Hampstead and it was from that point that he sailed for America in 1850. The voyage was made in a sail boat and it required forty-eight days to make the voyage. The first attempt was a failure, as the vessel was caught in a hurricane just before it reached New York and it was carried back to England. The successful trip was made later on the same boat.

He was a veteran of the Civil War having served throughout the conflict as a member of Co. B., 154th Indiana Infantry. He had been a member of the White church for nearly fifty years and took an active part in the church and community affairs.

He is survived by two children, Mary Shriner of Lafayette and Wm. Mitchell of near Bowers. Also four grand children, Fred Shriner of Attica, Jesse Shriner of Indianapolis, Florence Mitchell and Anna Rogers of Bowers, three great-grand children, Geraldine and Orville Shriner of Indianapolis and Georgiana Shriner of Lafayette.

The wife and three children preceded him in death, Mrs. Mitchell died Feb. 24, 1909. The deceased children are Hannah Elizabeth Hamilton, Dora Alice and Elcannie Mitchell.

OBITUARY OF JOHN McCABE

John McCabe was the son of Ezra and Adelia McCabe. He was born January 20, 1843 near Adelphi, O. Mr. McCabe came to Tippecanoe county, Indiana, in the year 1852 with his father, who later bought 240 acres now close to Chalmers, Indiana, and is known as the McCabe farm.

Very early in life he manifested the spirit of Christ, joined the M.E. church of which he remained a member 'till his going away. Here was one of Indiana's broad minded citizens as far as religious views were concerned, as he was willing to work for all denominations when they were concerned about his Lord. He transferred to the M.E. church of Colfax, Indiana about three years ago and had been in [illegible] who knew him [newspaper damaged] work for betterment of the community.

Before Mr. McCabe was of age he manifested that quality of patriotism which was willing to sacrifice all for the advantage of a united country, and in Feb. 1865, enlisted in Co. A. of the 80th Indiana Volunteers Infantry. He remained in the closing months of the great rebellion, and was given his honorable discharge in August 1865. ☞

In the early part of his wedded life he was a farmer and stock buyer, but in the last few years was living a retired life but never forgetting to read and keep abreast of the times. A man who had moral and righteous convictions of the very highest type. He was a prohibitionist from start to finish, first, last, and all the time.

Mr. McCabe had been married three times, first to Lydia McLaughlin and to this union two children were born, Rebecca and Sylvester, the daughter passing away in infancy and Sylvester is left to mourn the passing of his father. After the death of the first wife he was married to Rebecca Taylor, to this union were born two children who with the mother have passed on. In the year of 1907 Mr. McCabe was married to Mary Ann Alkele. This has been twenty years of a happy union but Mr. McCabe goes now to await the coming of the remainder of his family.

Mr. McCabe's last and serious illness was about two weeks, yet not a fret nor impatience in word was received from his lips and was cheerful in passing away. He thanked God for his years and that he had been able to live and see. He leaves to mourn his going, a loving companion, Mrs. Mary Ann McCabe, a son Sylvester both of Colfax, Indiana, a brother, Theodore McCabe, near Lafayette, Indiana, with nieces and nephews quire a few and also many relatives and friends.

DEATH OF JOHN HENRY BUNDY

Taps sounded for John Henry Bundy Sunday, and his spirit went on to join his comrades who have preceded him to the great beyond. His last but fatal illness was of a short duration, and his death came as a shock to the family and friends. He was a pioneer of the community having spent the greater part of his life in Colfax, where he followed his trade, that of a shoemaker.

He was a veteran of the Civil war having served with distinguished service as a volunteer in an Indiana regiment.

The funeral was conducted by Rev. V. V. Hackley at the M. E. church Tuesday afternoon and interment was made in the Plain View cemetery.

John Henry Bundy was the eldest of sixteen children of George and Margaret Bundy, and was born April 7, 1846, in Boone county near Thorntown, Indiana. He departed this life November 25, 1923, at his home in Colfax, at the age of 77 years, 7 months and 18 days.
